Then the Devil led Him up and showed Him in an instant all the kingdoms of the world. And the Devil said to Him, "To You I will give their glory and all this authority; for it has been given over to

me, and I give it to anyone I please (Luke 4:5,6 NIV).

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ...

On October the 2nd, I had the good fortune of receiving an invitation to participate in the prayer vigil here in Auburn. Several pastors and lay people prayed for our nation. They prayed that our nation would have a spiritual revival and we would turn back to God. It was a very powerful evening. As I was driving home that night I thought there is no doubt that our nation is in dire need of God's blessings.

The other day I was watching the news. I saw people rioting, looting, assaulting individuals, destroying private property and burning cars. Then I was watching the judicial hearings and how viciously the politicians were attacking the nominee to the Federal Supreme Court. Attacking her for no other reason but her faith in God. I watched how politicians blatantly lie and how they and their acolytes viciously attack anyone who disagrees with them. Sadly I see how families are torn apart by differences in ideologies. I thought what is happening to us? Suddenly, I was reminded of a monolog by Paul Harvey.

In 1965, Paul Harvey broadcasted a monolog titled, "If I Were the Devil". It is really amazing to realize over 55 years ago how accurately he "prophesied" the future spiritual condition of the United States of America. Many of his statements were considered ridiculously outlandish at that time in history. Yet, when we think about this, I must beg the question as to where do we find

ourselves today? Read the words of Paul Harvey as he delivered them on his radio show some 55 years ago...

If I were The Devil"

If I were the devil ... If I were the Prince of Darkness, I'd want to engulf the whole world in darkness. And I'd have a third of its real estate, and four-fifths of its population, but I wouldn't be happy until I had seized the ripest apple on the tree — Thee. So I'd set about however necessary to take over the United States. I'd subvert the churches first — I'd begin with a campaign of whispers. With the wisdom of a serpent, I would whisper to you as I whispered to Eve: 'Do as you please.'

"To the young, I would whisper that 'The Bible is a myth.' I would convince them that man created God instead of the other way around. I would confide that what's bad is good, and what's good is 'square.' And the old, I would teach to pray, after me, 'Our Father, which art in Washington...'

"And then I'd get organized. I'd educate authors in how to make lurid literature exciting, so that anything else would appear dull and uninteresting. I'd threaten TV with dirtier movies and vice versa. I'd pedal narcotics to whom I could. I'd sell alcohol to ladies and gentlemen of distinction. I'd tranquilize the rest with pills.

"If I were the devil I'd soon have families that war with themselves, churches at war with themselves, and nations at war with themselves; until each in its turn was consumed. And with promises of higher ratings I'd have mesmerizing media fanning the flames. If I were the devil I would encourage schools to refine young intellects, but neglect to discipline emotions — just let those

run wild, until before you knew it, you'd have to have drug sniffing dogs and metal detectors at every schoolhouse door.

"Within a decade I'd have prisons overflowing, I'd have judges promoting pornography — soon I could evict God from the courthouse, then from the schoolhouse, and then from the houses of Congress. And in His own churches I would substitute psychology for religion, and deify science. I would lure priests and pastors into misusing boys and girls, and church money. If I were the devil I'd make the symbols of Easter an egg and the symbol of Christmas a bottle.

"If I were the devil I'd take from those who have, and give to those who want until I had killed the incentive of the ambitious.

And what do you bet I could get whole states to promote gambling as the way to get rich? I would caution against extremes and hard work in Patriotism, in moral conduct. I would convince the young that marriage is old-fashioned, that swinging is more fun, that what you see on the TV is the way to be. And thus, I could undress you in public, and I could lure you into bed with diseases for which there is no cure. In other words, if I were the devil I'd just keep right on doing what he's doing.

Paul Harvey, good day."

Sadly, much of what Paul Harvey saw as emerging trends back in the 60's has come to fruition. Moreover, realizing that many readers may not believe in the devil, per se, doesn't change the fact that these portents have achieved fulfillment. Whether the causality is the devil or some may assert other nefarious evil or harmful sources, or merely the result of wanton and self-gratifying



human nature, the culmination of these destructive trends in society has dramatically come to realization in recent years.

Cultural society chose to ignore Paul Harvey's prophetic words spoken 55 years ago. The result is rioting and looting in our cities, police officers shot and killed, failing school systems and political corruption the likes our nation has never seen.

Today, right now - I ask you to put this newsletter down and immediately pray. Let us pray for our nation. Let us pray for our church. Let us pray for each other. Let us pray that we once again put God back into our society. Healing of the nation begins with prayer. Let us ask God for forgiveness, guidance and most of all His renewed blessing.



Growing through gratitude

Thankfulness, studies show, has multiple physical, mental and emotional benefits. Psychologist Robert Emmons calls

gratitude "fertilizer for the mind" because of its powerful effects.

He admits gratitude isn't always easy — especially when life throws us curveballs (see the year 2020) — but says it can be most helpful during and after difficulties. Emmons suggests reframing challenges using thankfulness-based language. Ask, for example: Though I wasn't grateful for the experience at the time, how can I be now? What lessons did I learn, and how did I grow as a person?

Throughout his letters, the apostle Paul reframes his extensive sufferings and urges us to do the same. "Give thanks in all circumstances," he writes, "for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus" (1 Thessalonians 5:18, NIV).

St. Andrew's Cross

This cross is a symbol of humility and suffering. It first came into use during the Middle Ages. According to tradition, St. Andrew was crucified while preaching in Greece. He felt unworthy to be crucified in the same way as Jesus, so he begged that his cross be made differently. St. Andrew's cross is the national cross of Scotland. It's also called Cross Saltire.



Solitude as soul care

Richard J. Foster (*Celebration of Discipline*) says solitude is "more a state of mind and heart" than a place: "There is a solitude of the heart that can be maintained at all times. Crowds, or

the lack of them, have little to do with this inward attentiveness."

Although Jesus preferred crowd-free alone times, that's not always feasible. But no matter your surroundings and responsibilities, you can carve out intentional time to "be still" (Psalm 46:10). Try these tips for adding solitude to life's rhythms:

- Take a day. Every month or two, enjoy a day of solitude. Turn off your phone and spend the day with God.
- Take an hour. Treat this time as an important calendar appointment. Keep it free to protect your solitude.
- Take a minute. Before a big meeting or as you're answering the phone, breathe deeply and invite God into the moment.

In 2016, Wanda Dench texted 17-year-old Jamal Hinton about Thanksgiving dinner, thinking she was contacting her grandson. When a skeptical Hinton requested a photo and received a selfie of someone with a different skin color, he chuckled — but then asked if he could still come eat! Thus began a new friendship and a new annual tradition, which Hinton documents online. "Family is more than blood," says Dench. "It's the people you want to be with."

This year's meal will be bittersweet, with an empty chair for Dench's husband, who died of Covid-19 in April. To show support after that loss, Hinton sent his "grandma" a collection of loving video messages. Strangers worldwide expressed condolences to a woman who'd fully embraced a stranger.
